

# Southern Nazarene University 2020 Fact Book

#### **Preface**

This fact book is prepared by the Office of Institutional Research and Assessment (IRA) at Southern Nazarene University (SNU) in fall 2020 and contains current and historical data about SNU.

With some exceptions, all data is captured on census day in the fall and spring semesters. Census day is a representation of the university's data taken on the tenth day of class in each semester. To capture the fluctuating course start and end dates for the College of Professional and Graduate Studies (PGS), students are counted as enrolled within a plus or minus two week window from census day. For Fall 2020, the census day is August 25, 2020. For the College of Undergraduate Studies (the traditional educational track and referred to as Traditional and 2020FA), this census is marked with all active enrollments on August 25, 2020. For the College of Professional and Graduate Studies (the non-traditional educational track and referred to as PGS and 2020P1), this census is marked with all active enrollments within the date window from August 11, 2020 to September 8, 2020.

This census data is captured and reported to various authorities for compliance including the U.S. Department of Education, the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education and the International Board of Education who share data publicly (see Page 96 for a list of annual survey participation).

Data provides the basis for calculating retention and graduation rates and provides insight into enrollment trends. This snapshot in time does not necessarily reflect the more fluid enrollment that occurs in accelerated programs. Data and tables present may differ from those found elsewhere due to definitions and the timing of data collection. The Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) definitions are included in Appendix B, and other definitions, to provide further clarification. ### **Overall Trends**

#### Total Student Enrollment from 1960 - 2020 Trendline




Total enrollment of all students at SNU on the fall census day in 1960 was 886 students. For the 2020 fall census day, total enrollment of all students is 2,208. This is an increase of 149.2% of all student enrollment (Table 1). It is important to note, from 1960 to 1985, student enrollment was counted as one educational program track. Starting in 1986, SNU created the Professional and Graduate Studies program allowing adult returning students to complete their degree. Thus, after that point enrollment figures are bifurcated into either a traditional educational track (College of Undergraduate Studies) or a non-traditional educational track (College of Professional and Graduate Studies). Note, Appendix B details the full data table for total enrollment from 1960 to 2020.

Trend analysis indicates an increase in overall student enrollment. Enrollment per College indicates a decrease in the traditional educational track and an increase in the non-traditional educational track. This suggests a higher demand in the non-traditional track and its offerings (Table 2).





Fall 2020 - Total Student Enrollment by Academic Level and Class Level









# Fall 2020 - Total Student Enrollment by Academic Level and Division









# Fall 2020 - Total Student Enrollment by Course Location and Course Load





Fall 2020 - Total Student Enrollment by Course Location and Academic Level



Fall 2020 - Total Student Enrollment by Course Location and Division







Fall 2020 - Total Student Enrollment by Ethnicity and College


Fall 2020 - Total Student Enrollment by Ethnicity and Sex


Fall 2020 - Total Student Enrollment by Race and College

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



Fall 2020 - Total Student Enrollment by Academic Level and Sex



Fall 2020 - Total Student Enrollment by Class Level and Sex





Fall 2020 - Total Student Enrollment by Age Range and Sex

Fall 2020 - Total Student Enrollment by Age Range and College





Fall 2020 - Total Student Enrollment by Nazarene and College



Fall 2020 - Total Student Enrollment by Class Level and Nazarene



Fall 2020 - Total Student Enrollment by Nazarene and Sex






Fall 2020 - Total Student Enrollment by Class Level and International Student



Fall 2020 - Total Student Enrollment by College and International Student



Fall 2020 - Total Student Enrollment by Sex and International Student



Fall 2020 - Total Student Enrollment by Academic Level and Military Servicemember/Veteran



Fall 2020 - Total Student Enrollment by Class Level and Military Servicemember/Veteran



Fall 2020 - Total Student Enrollment by Sex and Military Servicemember/Veteran



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Fall 2020 - Total Student Enrollment by Academic Level and Athlete



Fall 2020 - Total Student Enrollment by Sex and Athlete



Fall 2020 - Total Student Enrollment by Class Level and Athlete




Fall 2020 - First-time, Full-time Student Enrollment by Race from 2015 - 2020









Fall 2020 - First-time, Full-time Student Enrollment by Age and Sex



Fall 2020 - First-time, Full-time Student Enrollment by Application Tier Rating and Sex




#### Traditional Transfer Student Enrollment from 2006 - 2020 Trendline





### Fall 2020 - Total Traditional Transfer Student Enrollment by Class Level and Sex




Fall 2020 - Traditional Transfer Student Enrollment by Academic Program and Class Level

#### Total Traditional Student Enrollment by Class from 2014 - 2020 Trend








### Fall 2020 - Total Traditional Student Enrollment by Class Level and 2020 Federal Cohort






### Total Traditional Student Enrollment by Race from 2018 - 2020




Fall 2020 - Total Traditional Student Enrollment by Race and Sex



Fall 2020 - Total Traditional Student Enrollment by Denomination







### Traditional Student Enrollment by Oklahoma as Resident State from 2006 - 2020 Trendline




### Traditional Student Enrollment by South Central Region from 2010 - 2020 Trend



Fall 2020 - Total PGS Student Enrollment by Academic Program and Class Level




Fall 2020 - Total PGS Student Enrollment by Course Location




Fall 2020 - Total PGS Student Enrollment by Ethnicity and Sex




### Fall 2020 - Total PGS Student Enrollment by Class Level and Sex

Fall 2020 - Total Athlete Student Enrollment by Class Level and Sex




Fall 2020 - Total Athlete Student Enrollment by Academic Program


### Fall 2020 - Total Athlete Student Enrollment by Department and Division


Fall 2020 - Total Athlete Student Enrollment by Denomination

Fall 2020 - Total Military Servicemember/Veteran Enrollment by Race and Sex





## Total Staff (Non-Instructional) by Race and Sex



## Total Staff (Non-Instructional) by Race and Load



## All Instructional Staff by Status (Faculty and Adjunct) and Sex



## All Instructional Staff (Faculty and Adjunct) by Race and Sex




## Full-time Instructional Staff (Faculty) by Race and Academic Rank



## Full-time Instructional Staff (Faculty) by Race and Contract









This figure reports the average weekly class preparation time for your students compared to students in your comparison group.




#### Challenging Students to Do Their Best Work

To what extent did students' courses challenge them to do their best work? Response options ranged from 1 = "Not at all" to 7 = "Very much."










#### Satisfaction with SNU

# Ruffalo Noel-Levitz

Satisfaction assessments are a key indicator of the current situation for the institution. The data from the assessments provides direction for the campus to make improvements in the areas that matter most to students.

The Ruffalo Noel Levitz family of Satisfaction and Priorities Surveys (including the Student Satisfaction Inventory, the Adult Student Priorities Survey, the Adult Learner Inventory, and the Priorities Survey for Online Learners) ask students to indicate both the level of importance they place on an item, as well as their level of satisfaction that the institution is meeting this expectation. The combination of importance/satisfaction or agreement data is very powerful, allowing institutions to review satisfaction levels within the context of what is most important.

The results provide a roadmap for next steps that the institution can and should take to respond to the issues that students have identified. Additionally, SNU participates in the CCCU Collaborative Assessment Project (CAP) for which the Student Satisfaction Inventory survey provides a comparison report of CCCU member institutions.

### Appendix A - Glossary

Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) Definitions and Others:

**Academic program** – An instructional program leading toward an associate's, bachelor's, master's, doctor's, or professional practice degree (formerly called first-professional) or resulting in credits that can be applied to one of these degrees.

**Academic rank** – A status designated by the institution according to the institution's policies. The IPEDS HR survey includes the ranks of Professor, Associate Professor, Assistant Professor, Instructor, and Lecturer.

Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP) – A taxonomic coding scheme for secondary and postsecondary instructional programs. It is intended to facilitate the organization, collection, and reporting of program data using classifications that capture the majority of reportable data. The CIP is the accepted federal government statistical standard on instructional program classifications and is used in a variety of education information surveys and databases.

**Cohort** – A specific group of students established for tracking purposes.

Entering students (undergraduate) – Students at the undergraduate level, both full-time and part-time, coming into the institution for the first time in the fall term (or the prior summer term who returned again in the fall). This includes all first-time undergraduate students, students transferring into the institution at the undergraduate level for the first time, and non-degree/certificate-seeking undergraduates entering in the fall.

**Fall cohort** – The group of students entering in the fall term established for tracking purposes. For the Graduation Rates component, this includes all students who enter an institution as full-time, first-time degree/certificate-seeking undergraduate students during the fall term of a given year. For the Outcome Measures component, all degree/certificate-seeking undergraduate students who enter an institution during the fall term of a given year must be placed in one of four cohorts: full-time, first-time; part-time, first-time; full-time, non-first-time; and part-time, non-first-time.

**First-time student (undergraduate)** – A student who has no prior postsecondary experience (except as noted below) attending any institution for the first time at the undergraduate level. This includes students enrolled in academic or occupational programs. It also includes students enrolled in the fall term who attended college for the first time in the prior summer term, and students who entered with advanced standing (college credits earned before graduation from high school).

**First-year student** – A student who has completed less than the equivalent of one full year of undergraduate work; that is, less than 30 semester hours (in a 120-hour degree program) or less than 900 contact hours.

FTE of students – The full-time equivalent (FTE) of students is a single value providing a meaningful combination of full-time and part-time students. IPEDS data products currently have two calculations of FTE students, one using fall student headcounts and the other using 12-month instructional activity.

FTE staff – The full-time-equivalent (FTE) of staff is calculated by summing the total number of full-time staff from the Employees by Assigned Position (EAP) component and adding one-third of the total number of part-time staff.

Full-time, first-time degree/certificate-seeking undergraduate students (FTFT students) – A full-time, first-time degree/certificate-seeking undergraduate student is a student with no prior postsecondary experience who enrolled with the intent to earn a degree or certificate. Students who enrolled for the first time in the preceding summer term and students entering with advanced standing (i.e., college credits earned before high school graduation) are also considered first-time for IPEDS reporting

**Full-time student: Graduate** – A student enrolled for 9 or more semester credits, or 9 or more quarter credits, or a student involved in thesis or dissertation preparation that is considered full-time by the institution.

**Full-time student: Undergraduate** – A student enrolled for 12 or more semester credits, or 12 or more quarter credits, or 24 or more contact hours a week each term.

**Graduate student** – A student who holds a bachelor's degree or above and is taking courses at the post baccalaureate level. These students may or may not be enrolled in graduate programs.

**Graduation rate** – The rate required for disclosure and/or reporting purposes under the Student Right-to-Know Act. This rate is calculated as the total number of completers within 150% of normal time divided by the revised adjusted cohort.

Null – no value for attribute in student's record

**Official Church Mission** – An official church mission is one that is established by the church of which the individual is a member and that results in the individual being unable to attend a postsecondary institution during the period of the mission.

**Part-time student: Graduate** – A student enrolled for less than 9 semester or quarter credits.

**Part-time student: Undergraduate** – A student enrolled for either less than 12 semester or quarter credits, or less than 24 contact hours a week each term.

**Race and ethnicity unknown** – The category used to report students or employees whose race and ethnicity are not known.

Race/ethnicity – Categories developed in 1997 by the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) that are used to describe groups to which individuals belong, identify with, or belong in the eyes of the community. The categories do not denote scientific definitions of anthropological origins. The designations are used to categorize U.S. citizens, resident aliens, and other eligible non-citizens.

Individuals are asked to first designate ethnicity as:

- Hispanic or Latino or
- Not Hispanic or Latino

Second, individuals are asked to indicate all races that apply among the following:

- American Indian or Alaska Native
- Asian
- Black or African American
- Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander
- White

Retention rate – A measure of the rate at which students persist in their educational program at an institution, expressed as a percentage. For 4-year institutions, this is the percentage of first-time bachelor's (or equivalent) degree-seeking undergraduates from the previous fall who are again enrolled in the current fall. For all other institutions, this is the percentage of first-time degree/certificate-seeking students from the previous fall who either re-enrolled or successfully completed their program by the current fall.

**Semester (calendar system)** – A calendar system that consists of two sessions called semesters during the academic year with about 15 weeks for each semester of instruction. There may be an additional summer session.

**Transfer-in student** – A student entering the reporting institution for the first time but known to have previously attended a postsecondary institution at the same level (e.g., undergraduate, graduate). This includes new students enrolled in the fall term who transferred into the institution the prior summer term. The student may transfer with or without credit.

**Transfer-out student** – A student that leaves the reporting institution and enrolls at another institution.

**Undergraduate** – A student enrolled in a 4- or 5-year bachelor's degree program, an associate's degree program, or a vocational or technical program below the baccalaureate.
